In addition to direct grant investments, we provide our partners with technical assistance, facilitate trainings, conduct community programming, provide volunteers, and engage in strategic community collaboratives. Together, we co-create solutions tailored to the specific needs of our communities.

Addressing housing insecurity

Kaiser Permanente teamed up with **15** nonprofits in the Inland Empire to address homelessness and health disparities. The Inland Empire suffers from a housing crisis, with homeless populations rising sharply. Our initiative targets the root causes and acknowledges the adverse effects of homelessness on health and well-being. Kaiser Permanente invested **\$3 million** to enhance health care access, prevent evictions, and advocate for affordable housing policies.

The **Hippocrates Circle Program** seeks to inspire diverse and underrepresented middle school students to pursue careers in medicine or health care. The program partners with schools across Southern California to deliver a series of engaging educational events for students, families, and their communities. Students have an opportunity to connect and learn from physicians that may reflect their own personal experience and diverse background. In 2023, 35 students completed the program.

Kaiser Permanente provided **GRID Alternatives Inland Empire** with a \$24,500 grant for workforce development and sustainable clean energy career pathways for individuals facing employment barriers. Their efforts aim to increase representation of people of color in the solar energy industry. Since its inception in 2011, GRID Alternatives Inland Empire has enabled over 4,471 graduates to acquire marketable skills, hands-on training, and employment opportunities in the technology-based renewable energy sector. Notably, the Clean Tech Training Center in Riverside trained 200 individuals in 2023.

Coachella Valley Volunteers in Medicine offers vital primary health services to uninsured residents in Coachella Valley. Through a decade-long agreement with Kaiser Permanente Riverside, radiology images are provided at no cost to patients. In 2023, 199 patients were referred to Kaiser Permanente for basic x-rays, aiding in diagnosing conditions and determining treatment plans. This partnership enhances access to specialty care for uninsured individuals, facilitating timely interventions and addressing health concerns effectively.
